Latin singular verbs	Simple English translation	Progressive English translation	Emphatic English translation
ōrō	I pray.	I am praying.	I do pray.
ōrās	<i>You pray.</i>	<i>You are praying.</i>	<i>You do pray.</i>
ōrat	<i>He, she, it prays.</i>	<i>He, she, or it is praying.</i>	<i>He, she or it does pray.</i>
